I often find myself wondering where the Holy Spirit is leading this Church of ours. Let's keep faith with the Spirit and pray for the strength to see and hear the painful details of this Calvary walk we all are on. Let's pray for the ability to guiet our minds enough to notice what God is calling us to do in love and service of this huge transformative process She is undertaking through us and with us at this time in history. We're in this together with our brothers, whether they see it or not, and with our sisters who stand on the front lines, hearts open, inviting us to follow the Gospel mandate to repent of self-absorption so as to truly love and serve those in need. Let's join with the women religious, our mothers in the faith, and enter that deep process of discernment they have now begun. Standing with them, attuned to their authentic prayerful and heart-filled leadership, we allow the Pentecost Spirit to inspire and lead the way.
