Summer greetings everyone,

We begin "Ordinary Time" in earnest as we transit through these next few months of summer. An "ordinary" season focuses our attention on the "daily" aspects of our lives. We look at routine and at balancing that routine with variety, spontaneity, creativity, appreciation for the moment-to-moment experience of life itself as it unfolds in awesomely ordinary ways. Whether it's the peas that are blooming and fruiting on their trellised vines or the raspberries ripening in bunches within their tangled thicket of leaves, the ordinary miracle of life-force rising, greening, fluttering, surging, and blooming in our gardens and across the landscape is both breath-taking and, well, normal. We often take for granted things that are extraordinary because we've somehow learned to ignore that which brings forth, nourishes and sustains life just as we've learned to trivialize ordinary reality. The renowned theologian, Dorothee Soelle, wrote: "The trivialization of life is perhaps the strongest antimystical force among us." She goes on to say, "The relevance of any expression of life now depends on what it can yield in the exchange of the currency of power and money. Everything else is trivialized away. Perhaps there is no weapon that has been used as perversely and effectively against the otherness of children and women's conscientization than this creeping trivialization of experiences and feelings that are considered pointless for the struggle for survival." Paying attention to the ordinary day-to-day experiences of our lives, and to the emotional and sensual textures of those experiences which constitute our feelings, provides a window into inner realms where God lives, where Spirit is alive, where Wisdom is available and where Divine guidance weaves itself through warp and weft of earth reality and human existence. The path of the mystic is the path of attending to the ordinary, knowing God is there reaching toward us, beckoning our inquisitive curiosity, waiting to be playfully and joyously found. Our readings for July liturgies are: July 8-Eugene-Ezek 2:2-5; 2 Cor 12:7-10; Mk 6:1-6a. July 14-Portland—Amos 7:12-15; Eph 1:3-14; Mk 6:7-13. July 29—Battleground—2 Kings 4:42-44; Eph 4:1-6; Jn 6:1-15.
