So we start with the Council as a way of expanding the connections between Eugene and Portland community hubs. # **Support the Sisters**

Many of you have been following the story of the Vatican's "doctrinal assessment" of the Leadership Conference of Women Religious, a group representing 80% of Catholic nuns in the U.S. The Vatican has accused the group of promoting "radical feminist themes incompatible with the Catholic faith," undermining church teachings on

homosexuality and birth control, hosting speakers that "often contradict or ignore" church teachings, and making public statements that "disagree with or challenge the bishops." LCWR will be holding its annual meeting in St. Louis next week, Aug. 7 to 11, and will be discerning a response to Vatican accusations. To express solidarity with the nuns and show support for LCWR there will be a prayer vigil this Wednesday, August 8, at St. Francis of Assisi, SE 12<sup>th</sup> and Oak, from 7:00 to 7:45pm. You are asked to bring family and friends and to spread the word. Such vigils will be held next week in cities across the country. It's as if my individual response determines whether justice or injustice will prevail in the world. Just reading the mail can be exhausting. Recently a friend reminded me that justice-making comes in large and small packages, and that even the smallest package is important. There is no way of knowing whether the impact of Sophia Christi will be large or small. I only know it is work you and I have been given as we call for a return to Vatican II principles, Vatican II theology and ecclesiology, and respect for the Spirit's call to women to provide leadership in a Church so heavily identified with male-dominant practices and perspectives.

The vision of the prophet focuses the lens of society and its leaders on the cry for justice. U.S. nuns are on that prophetic edge at the national level and within the corridors of institutional church structures in unexpected ways. In our own small corner of society, the "parish" of Sophia Christi focuses the vision of many on the cry for justice, for renewal and reform within that church. It is a cause worthy of time, energy and resources. As we begin this 6<sup>th</sup> year of ministry, may our mission be aligned with the dreams and intentions of Vatican II, and may Sophia guide our steps in the months and years ahead.
