A glorious Fall greeting to all of you,

On October 11 we celebrate the opening of the Second Vatican Council 50 years ago! For those of us who lived through those astoundingly hope-filled days from 1962 to 1965 it is a bittersweet reminder of how excruciatingly difficult it can be to transform an ancient structure imbedded in an even more ancient world-view. In 1962 we were still ten years away from Apollo 17's transmission of the "blue marble" photo of earth which gave us our first glimpse of "home" from regions beyond earth's orbit and changed our perspective of life on this planet, and indeed our global paradigm, forever. Our minds were blown wide open on multiple psychological and spiritual levels in those days and many of us believed we had entered a new age of global connection with foundation stones being set in place for world-wide transformation. Our youthful expectation of real, dramatic, and immediate change was, and possibly still is, our one major stumbling block to remaining in sync with God's timeline of change.

The Church of John XXIII and Vatican II was a church on the brink of self-renewal so deep and so profound that religious leaders from every point on the spectrum began taking notice. In fact, many of them had been invited to participate in Council proceedings as observers. The Spirit was moving through the old Roman Church, and through the many churches of the Reformation by extension. A fresh and holy air was removing cobwebs as well as barriers, shaking structures to their foundations. We were re-discovering our ancient roots in Jewish spirituality and culture as well as excavating Gospel-filled building blocks that held the promise of becoming cornerstones of a renewed and revitalized Christianity.

It hasn't been easy to let go of the heady idealism of youth. The loss of hope has morphed into a kind of cynicism for some, despair for others, apathy for many and a heart-full of un-named, unclaimed and unspoken grief for, perhaps, a vast majority of those who witnessed the erosion of the promise and potential of Vatican II. But this is where the role of "prophet" takes form. This is where the task of fire-tending is left to those with patience, hope and faith, who are able to keep embers glowing until the Spirit can re-ignite the fires of transformation, pastoral care and compassion at the heart of Church vision and governance. We who tend the embers lend our voices to the Prophet's call for accountability in leadership, inclusivity in practice, openness of mind and heart in all human discourse, and compassion for all God's people everywhere. This is our privileged mission as Sophia Christi. We are part of a prophetic circle of linked hearts and hands, forming an earth-grid for Spirit's continuing development of theology, ecclesiology, moral and ethical evolution of human consciousness around the globe. We may not see even one outcome of this effort in our lifetime, but prophets seldom do. We keep faith in Spirit's work, hold onto hope, support one another and simply and courageously carry on.
