Advent greetings to all of you,

On this first Sunday of Advent we enter a season of waiting, of hope. We are called on a journey, asked to follow a star that leads to a humble stable where an unwed teen mother is about to give birth to her first child. All we know about this young girl is that she said "yes" to an angel and, in so doing, put her life, her reputation and her future on the line. One day she was an ordinary kid, and the next she was in the throes of a Godthing that took over her life bringing joy, stress, hardship, questions and, ultimately, a tortuous walk with her son that would rip open the heart of any parent. It's a story we've heard so many times we may forget the stark human-ness of it, the sheer craziness of setting out on a trek by foot, almost nine months pregnant, with no idea where you might be at the onset of labor! We give little real thought to what that "yes" meant, in the short term and the long term for Mary, or for Joseph. "Yesses" are like that, especially any "yes" requiring we follow an illusive "sign in the heavens" or a persistent "inner prompting" that won't go away. We don't really know what the "angels" in our lives are inviting us into, or where a "yes" to the invitation might lead. We can be assured an acceptance of the invitation will require faith at some point, courage at another, love and compassion continuously and a growing capacity to return again and again to a place of hope. Advent reminds us that darkness is an unavoidable part of the human journey, even as it is part of the natural cycles and rhythms of our days and our seasons. Darkness teaches us faith, hope, courage, teaches us the depths of love, teaches in ways we often resist and reject fearing the unknown, fearing pain. Yet when light enters the darkness and illuminates those "dark" teachings, it transforms them through insight, understanding and integration into treasured gifts whose value matches or exceeds the tremendous cost experienced through the teaching process. Childbirth is like that. Mothers, like Mary, teach us that. The story of Advent is a story of waiting in the darkness, waiting faithfully, courageously, saying "yes" to the angel, saying "yes" to the difficult and dangerous journey even though physically arduous and psychologically exhausting, walking toward who-knows-where in the dark we follow the star. All we know is that birth will happen. Our job is to wait with expectancy and anticipation, making ready, preparing a place in our hearts for the unfolding story as we live into the "yes," in the dark, walking with faith, holding onto the hand of hope.

December 1. The sun is out and there is yard work to do and Christmas shopping to start. Instead I've decided to attend the Sophia Christi retreat. It's being held at Northminster Presbyterian, our Portland home, and I know most of the other 22 people there. From the gathering circle where we shared our desires for the retreat, I knew I'd made a good choice. During the day Carmel gave us opportunities to ponder Scripture, to contemplate the Advent theme of "waiting," to share and to reflect silently. The sharing was deep and meaningful. We prayed, listened to stories and music, sang and told one another over and over what a gift it is to be part of this community and to participate in this retreat. Though the sun went away mid-morning, the light of God's love never left the room. At the end of the day we sat in a circle in the dining hall for Mass. After our dialogue homily we blessed and anointed incoming and outgoing Council members. As we gathered around them and laid hands of thanks and support, God's spirit was clearly present. It's an exciting journey we've undertaken, and now that the non-profit process and paperwork are behind us, the Council can give its attention to Mission and vision.
