A joyous New Year and blessed Epiphany to all of you,

As the Christmas "season" gives way to plans and resolutions for a new year, pause with me and allow the spiritual significance of these past few weeks to inform a new perspective. The "Light of the World" re-entered human consciousness on a grand scale as billions of us celebrated the birth of Jesus less than two weeks ago. For over a month choral music, crèche displays, decorated houses, shopping malls and evergreens formed the backdrop of our common social experience. In the days immediately preceding Christmas a greater sense of generosity, goodwill and kindness seemed evident everywhere I went. The "Light of the World" seemed to have entered the collective consciousness in ways both noticeable and subtle. The Christmas Spirit was alive! Though less evident now, as we lurch forward into 2015 and the busy routines that characterize modern life, that Light continues to enlighten and encourage those of us willing to watch for its appearance and follow its lead. It is active within us as individuals and as a people, urging us toward generous acts of kindness, toward openness and acceptance of the "other," toward awareness and support for the common good, and toward a dynamic justice that begets true peace.

Sunday, January 4<sup>th</sup>, the Church calendar called us to celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany. Though largely ignored in the U.S., the 12<sup>th</sup> Day of Christmas focuses attention on the Magi (also called wise men or astrologers) from the East who followed a star as it led them to the infant Jesus. When King Herod heard of this newborn "king of the Jews" he worried the child might threaten his own position of power. He summoned the Magi and asked for information about the child's whereabouts, feigning a desire to honor this new king. The story contrasts the darkness embedded in ego-driven designs for power with the light that guides humble seekers to the cradle of Truth, Goodness and Love. It highlights an intrinsic human ability to perceive God's presence everywhere and in everything—in planetary phenomena, in dreams and intuitions, as well as in other human beings.

It is instructive to recognize that the Magi are not Jews. From the very beginning Jesus reached beyond the boundaries of religion and tribe to touch the minds and hearts of diverse peoples. And the Magi returned to their 'own country'. They did not become Jews. They did not become disciples or followers of Jesus. They went 'Home by another way.' Regardless of cultural norms or religious beliefs, God is available to everyone. And 'the heart that sees rightly' is a heart open to an epiphany of Divine expression and presence any moment, any place—everywhere.

### Christmas Eve in Eugene

Twenty-four of us gathered at the home of Dianne and Amanda for our 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Christmas Eve Mass in Eugene. At the homily we shared personal stories and insights while reflecting on the birth of Jesus as a mirror of who we are—humanly divine beings created out of the only essence that exists in the universe, the essence of God. Like Jesus we, too, can come to know who we are—divine beings who are fully human—and we can learn to live humbly while knowing both the limitations of our humanity and the all-inclusive Oneness, mercy and vast loving nature of our divinity. Christmas Eve ended with conversation, hot apple cider, and yummy seasonal treats.

### Food for the St. Andrew Episcopal Food Pantry

The St. Andrew Food Pantry continues in operation, though end-of-year changes may affect future operations. We will collect food and personal hygiene items again this month at our Masses. Watch the February newsletter for more details. Look for the basket at the entrance to the sanctuary when you come for Liturgy on Saturday or Sunday, and please be as generous as possible.

When we come together next weekend to celebrate the Baptism of Jesus we will have reached the traditional end of the Christmas season. We transition quickly from Jesus' birth to his baptism, which marks the beginning of his ministry. Just five weeks later Lent will begin (Ash Wednesday is February 18<sup>th</sup>).

If we allow Jesus' birth to mirror for us the Divine/human nature we all possess, then his baptism takes us one step further in deepening that radical awareness. As Richard Rohr puts it, God is our DNA. There is no such thing as "adoption" into the family of God; we are all beloved daughters and sons. All of us have God's DNA.

This year will provide many opportunities to relegate others to the status of "enemy." There will be no lack of controversy and plenty of occasions to vilify and denigrate other human beings. As tempting as this might be, I wonder what might happen if we kept in the forefront of our minds the Divine DNA we all share? The human experience is challenging for all of us. The body has its own needs, which must be met for survival, and the structure of the brain influences our psychology and how we manage to process information. Culture, language, geography and education affect what we can and cannot see. We all navigate the waters of human experience as best we can. We make mistakes and hurt ourselves, and others, along the way. As "children" of God, we learn and grow through it all. But at our core we are divine beings with a divine destiny—all of us. How might we live differently on this earth, I wonder, if we were all able to know and to accept this truth about our individual and collective identity?
