Dear friends,

These last few days have been glorious—sunny, warm, the air filled with flower essences I can't clearly distinguish while tulips, daffodils and magnolias greet me as I walk around the neighborhood. People are out gardening, sprucing up their yards, and greeting me with open smiles as I pass. "Enjoying the sun?" we ask each other. A letter carrier hurries from the post office and runs past me saying "I have the rest of the day off to be in the sun!" We both laugh as he continues on his merry way. I can't help but think how perfect the timing. It's the first week of Easter and people seem joyous, as though they've finally been released from the tomb-like confinement of the rain and cold of winter. It is nearly impossible to stay indoors. The sun and warmth beckons with a magnetism too compelling to ignore. It is our springtime 'return of the sun' and it promises refreshment, a healing of spirits and renewed life for dampened hearts if we surrender to its remedial powers. Easter works in similar ways deep in our souls. We are invited to greater openness and vulnerability so Christ's Light can enter us, and through us enter the world. We are summoned out of self-protective behavioral tombs into the warmth and beauty of human connectedness, and the fresh task of building and re-building community. We hear this invitation in today's readings as Jesus appears to the disciples who are huddled behind locked doors for fear of the Jewish authorities. "Peace be with you," he says, before showing them his hands and his side to reassure them that it is, indeed, him. What he does then is give them a mission that will require them to leave that locked room, that tomb of fear, and go out among the people offering forgiveness, mercy, understanding and compassion. But Thomas is missing from the group that evening, and doesn't see Jesus. He missed that pivotal experience and doesn't believe. Jesus knows, however, that the whole family is needed for the mission of building the human community into a cohesive whole. Forgiveness and mercy are needed. Inclusivity is needed. So he returns the following week for Thomas. John tells us the disciples "were again inside." They didn't stay behind those locked doors! They received the Holy Spirit from Jesus and took themselves out into the world. In the first reading from Acts today we're told: "many signs and wonders were done among the people at the hands of the disciples." Though their listeners were reluctant to join them for fear of persecution it didn't stop the disciples from spreading the light, joy and curative power of Easter to all they met. God's sunshine for the cold, water logged soul, was alive then and is alive now in God's people who bring the healing warmth of kindness and compassion into a waiting world.

Today is Divine Mercy Sunday. In his homily today, Pope Francis said: "Not everything (by the author of John's Gospel) was written down; the Gospel of mercy remains an open book, in which the signs of Christ's disciples...concrete acts of love and mercy, continue to be written. We are all called to become living writers of the Gospel, heralds of the Good News to all men and women today...The Gospel of mercy, to be proclaimed and written in our daily lives, seeks people with patient and open hearts, "good Samaritans" who understand compassion and silence before the mystery of each brother and sister. The Gospel of mercy requires generous and joyful servants, people who love freely without expecting anything in return." What if we begin to see ourselves as "living writers of the Gospel?" If we truly embody the identity of 'disciple' and allow ourselves to stand in that room behind locked doors witnessing the return of Jesus, if we feel his breath as he imparts the Holy Spirit and hear his words sending us out to forgive people, to show them mercy, to exercise understanding and compassion—what Gospel story might each of us write? It is interesting to contemplate the Gospel as an open book, a collection of stories still being written today which will continue to be written as long as there are people who take up the mission Jesus has entrusted to his followers. We are among those followers. Standing in that room, seeing the wounds he shows us, feeling his breath and hearing his voice, are you prepared to be a conduit of Light and Mercy? We stand before the Mystery with open hearts to the best of our ability, growing in courage, taking one step at a time toward an increased willingness to be vulnerable. The sunshine and beauty of spring can make it easier to be hopeful and relaxed in our vulnerability. The Light of Easter can help us know that our efforts in the interest of love and mercy are never wasted, and will, in fact, produce ongoing ripples of goodness through the end of time.
