Dear friends,

The leaves of the two Gingko trees outside my window are gloriously yellow against the backdrop of orange, red and bronze maple leaves across the street. Yesterday it seemed they had trapped the previous day's sunlight in order to radiate hope and joy on a rainy fall day. I am grateful for the golden radiance of those leaves and for the bright yellow carpet of their fallen companions lining the sidewalk. They punctuate the framed landscape of a duty-filled world as if inviting one and all to luxuriate, even for a moment, in the awesome glory of our earthly home. As I gaze into the leaf-strewn landscape I allow nature to enter my soul. When I listen to the rain and watch it pour through the barren limbs of towering oak, drenching the grasses, washing away dirt and pollen I imagine the whole world washed clean of hatred, fear and rage. I see it saturated by God's grace, impregnated with Christ's light, gestating Sophia's wisdom, and preparing to give birth to a human-Divine order of tenderness and peace.

We are in the end-days of this liturgical year. The timing coincides with a sudden plunge into earlier evening darkness (return to Standard Time) and the end of an especially dark political contest that has triggered anxiety, even paranoia, throughout our nation as well as beyond our borders. So many of us are nervous as we face into the coming week. Whatever the results of Tuesday's nail-biting drama, and its likely stressful aftermath, we have clearly seen the many fault lines within our social landscape. As painful as this is and has been, we cannot address the shadow side of our national psyche until we clearly see it. And see it we do, now more than ever. Fear is everywhere, unbridled and increasingly vicious. For many it feels like end-times. But for many others there is a ray of hope visible in the over-arching gloom. What we can see and claim can ultimately save us; it is what we deny that leads to our destruction. There is pain and grace in that final willingness to see.

Just after Thanksgiving, on Sunday the 27th, we enter Advent and the new church year begins. After mourning the dead and wrestling with the inevitable ending of our lives, the world as we know it and all that it means to us, we move into waiting. We allow ourselves to re-experience hope. There is light and promise buried within the heart of darkness and it begins to rise like magma from the earth's core, from the depths of our own instinctive knowing that death and darkness is not the end, is never the end. Birth awaits us—the birth of Light as the days begin to lengthen at Winter Solstice, the birth of the Christ child once again at Christmas. All creation has been groaning in labor pains until now, Paul tells the Romans, in one great act of giving birth (Rom 8:22). The chaos of these times remind us of his words. Let us hold one another in love as we move through these next few days. We are all part of this great upheaval ushering new life into the world. It's messy, excruciating, and frightening, but we are here to do our part. And we are not alone. As followers of Christ may we always act with kindness holding steady in hope and faith.

Lectors: Sunday Mass Readings: If you are interested in accessing the readings for our weekend Masses they can be found at http://www.usccb.org/bible/readings/ which is the US Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) website. We use the Sunday readings for both Saturday and Sunday Masses. Though the Church designates the New American Bible (NAB) translation to be used at liturgies, Sophia Christi uses the translation created by Priests For Equality because of its commitment to inclusive

language. Lectors will find some differences between the two but are still encouraged to prepare using the USCCB site since variations are somewhat minimal.
