The season of Lent begins in just 10 days. I am both fascinated and delighted that Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day this year and Easter lands on April Fools' Day. I suppose it is the child in me that finds this calendar detail so absorbing, but the juxtaposition of religious and secular observances in these early months of 2018 has been riveting my attention from the moment I first noticed it was happening. At the same time that I'm aware of this 'coincidence' in timing as a kind of happenstance occurrence, I am also intrigued by Spirit's invitation to see God at play in our world and in our lives. It isn't that I think God has orchestrated this arrangement of the calendar (though I'm also not saying God's hand isn't in it somehow, somewhere). What I am suggesting is that Sophia, Holy Wisdom, may be beckoning us into a playful game of hide-and-seek with God this Lent. We see God 'hiding' in the odd, even hilarious Valentine Ashes and Easter Fool details of the season while playfully challenging us to dive deep in our 'seeking' of a not-so-somber Divine Presence at the 'heart' of everything. A long time ago the Church forgot about 'play' and adopted an attitude of 'harsh discipline' and 'threats of punishment' as the chosen method of moving people toward change. 'Penance' became another word for self-denial and we were taught to 'give something up for Lent.' Then sometime after Vatican II the tide began to shift and we were invited to 'take something on' for Lent—a prayer practice, a social action project, acts of generosity, etc. But the idea of becoming childlike before God wasn't one of the options. Ashes on Valentine's Day and an April Fools Easter introduces a different way of approaching Lent this year, and I have a silly sense of God's desire to remind us all that we are 'children', that we are deeply and profoundly loved, that we are cradled in that Valentine Heart of Divinity and that nothing we have ever done or can ever do will change that very basic fact. So our task is to open our eyes, ears and hearts for that love to pour in. We are being urged to let go our judgments and seek the God of paradox, the God of surprises, in the messy incarnational reality of our world at this very time (2018) in our history.

I am also reminded of a sonnet by William Wordsworth: "The world is too much with us; late and soon, getting and spending, we lay waste our powers; little we see in Nature that is ours; We have given our hearts away...!" It is time to take back our hearts and our powers as God's children. The 'April fool' and the 'ashes' remind us there are things that require our attention if we are to heed God's voice this season and return to the heart of what Really Matters. The 'world of getting and spending' pulls us away from one another and unravels the bonds between us. It also blinds us to the destruction of nature that underpins the 'getting and spending' cycles that fuel the world's economy. How do the myriad distractions bombarding us daily encourage us to be unconscious and allow the 'wasting' of our powers and resources? How do we reclaim our hearts and turn our faces once again in the direction of the One, central Divine Heart holding us all, and the world, in an embrace of love? Answers to these questions lie in prayer. It is through seeking the playfully hidden God, the God who would delight, lovingly challenge, guide and patiently speak to us in the deep chambers of our hearts, that we will find answers, or at least a direction we might turn to pursue them. It is a quest we are invited to embark on each Lent, but this year there is playfulness embedded in the journey. Coincidence? It doesn't matter. It is there...

Lectors: Sunday Mass Readings: If you are interested in accessing the readings for our weekend Masses they can be found at http://www.usccb.org/bible/readings/ which is the US Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) website. We use the Sunday readings for both Saturday and Sunday Masses. Though the Church designates the New American Bible (NAB) translation to be used at liturgies, Sophia Christi uses the translation created by Priests For Equality because of its commitment to inclusive language. Lectors will find some differences between the two but are still encouraged to prepare using the USCCB site since variations are somewhat minimal.

We are grateful to have been able to extend our outreach to the poor and marginalized through our dedicated volunteers.

Through the years we have needed to make changes as our members have discontinued their volunteer services with a particular agency, the agency itself disbanded, or we recognized a need to shift our focus and priorities. In adapting to a series of changes over the last six months, we will no longer be collecting items for either Rose Haven in Portland or the Catholic Worker in Eugene.

This month we embark on a new effort by re-opening our 'Ministry Partner' initiative. If you are currently volunteering with a non-profit organization serving the poor, homeless, marginalized or immigrant populations in Portland or Eugene, and you would like the organization to be considered as a potential Sophia Christi ministry partner, please respond to Toni via this newsletter or contact one of the Council members. In order to be considered you or another member of Sophia Christi must be a current volunteer with the non-profit and must continue in that capacity for the duration of our partnership. We hope to begin this new phase of our outreach ministry as soon as possible and to enter into a new and meaningful relationship with an organization that shares our values of service to the 'stranger among us' living on the edge of our society without a safety net.

I had the great privilege of being on a silent retreat this past week in which I spent many hours sitting, resting, walking, praying. It was a graced time. Things fell together as if orchestrated by God's hand, and what I felt each day was pure gratitude. My reflections today are grounded in that guiet time. At various points in the journey snippets of songs or surprising phrases would pop into my mind. Some caused me to laugh out loud. Some left me pondering and sent me straight to my journal. Some came in filmy images that required colored pencils and felt-tipped markers to truly 'see' what was being evoked or 'shown.' Some left me deeply unsettled, even confused, while others remain dangling, like threads of a weaving that don't yet know where they belong. This, for me, is the mysterious, sometimes dry and sometimes awe-inspiring journey of life engaged through the medium of prayer. Lent is an invitation to this kind of journey. Silence is not a requirement, nor is time 'apart' from the changeable nature of normal life. All that is required is a practice of showing up at some appointed time every day to be 'at home' with God. It might take the form of a one-sided conversation at times. It might resemble a psalm of lament when 'the world is too much with us.' For the artist prayer might take the form of a drawing, painting or collage. For the writer, the poet, prayer might manifest in a poem or letter to God. For the musician it might be a time with one's instrument playing whatever melodies want to be expressed as prayer in that moment. There are so many ways to pray. Simply watching cloud formations move across the sky can be a form of prayer when you open your heart to God. May you be inspired as Lent draws near to embark on a practice of prayer. It can take as many forms as Spirit places before your mind's eye. It can be one thing or many. If you set the intention and show up God will take the lead. And if it seems like nothing is happening don't worry, it is. Just by the simple fact of you showing up something is happening in the deep recesses of your heart. God is present there, always, drawing your deeper into love, sometimes speaking in movements you can barely discern or have not developed the capacity, yet, to recognize. Have faith. That's what 'return to the Gospel' means—return to the good news of God's unfathomable and unconditional love. In your imagination place your hand in God's hand and trust the Love that will never let you go.
